About Face Youth Theatre is an identity-affirming theatre activism program. LGBTQIA youth and their allies ages 14-23 explore and expand the boxes we use to define our intricate intersections of race, nationality, gender, and sexuality.

BRAVELIKEM

Brave Like Them, the 2017 world premiere from AFYT, investigated the underground "riot grrrl" movement of the 1990s. While the music and literature of this movement was typically characterized by an unapologetic expression of female power and an aggressive dismantling of the patriarchy - the voices at its forefront were almost exclusively white and middle-class.

Brave Like Them celebrated the "riot grrrl" movement for all the good that came out of it - but also dissected its inherent racial and class discrepancies.




The Show

looking out // looking in

30 min play & interactive discussion

Hilarious, relevant, and poignant, looking out // looking in is a collection of stories that connects issues around race, class, sexuality, age, gender, and self-esteem. The play features the true stories of the performers and the audience is encouraged to ask the actors about their stories and share experiences. This play speaks specifically to transgender identity and allyship.

The Education Outreach Program at About Face Theatre provides touring performances and workshops to schools as an entertaining, compelling, and necessary approach to starting dialogue about bullying, diversity, and intersecting identities. Our standard format includes a performance followed by a talk-back; however we do offer more in-depth break-out discussion sessions or hands-on storytelling workshops with the audience following the performance.





Youth Task Force

The Youth Task Force (YTF) is AFYT's youth leadership committee, comprised of 2 ensemble members who are committed to the group's work. YTF leads the AFYT ensemble by selecting show topics/themes, facilitating workshop activities, organizing social excursions, and curating a special event each year.

This year, the YTF also spearheaded a number of artistic collaborations with local youth-driven arts organizations, including:



Youth Artivism Symposium

For FY17's special event, the YTF reprised their **Youth Artivism Symposium** (YAS). Now in its third year, the event brought together over 30 young and socially engaged artists of diverse mediums and backgrounds (up 5 from last year's event) to Adler University's downtown campus to share practices and celebrate artmaking for social justice.
